The varieties of video experience

If, as McLuhan taught, the content of a new technology is always the old technology that has just been superceded, then surely video's moment has arrived. The reorientation of Canadian filmmaking towards broadcasting means that, more than ever before, video has become the privileged medium of the '80s in Canada.
