Graeme Ferguson honoured for IMAX work

BEVERLY HILLS, CALIF. - Toronto-based Imax Systems Corporation, whose president Graeme Ferguson was presented with a Special Achievement Award March 20 at the 1986 Genie Awards, had that honour preceded by being awarded an Academy Scientific and Engineering Award at a March 16 Academy of Motion Picture Arts & Sciences awards presentation dinner.

IMAX's vice-president of engineering and operations, William C. Shaw - who is also the designer of the IMAX projector

- accepted the Academy plaque, which was awarded to the corporation for "a method of filming and exhibiting high fidelity, large format, wide angle motion pictures." The Academy citation further commended IMAX for its development of the rolling loop projector and associated equipment integral to the IMAX and OMNI-MAX formats, as well as for the "exceptional sense of participation (is) experienced by audiences when pictures are shown in IMAX or OMNIMAX theatres."

The two formats were launched respectively in 1970 and 1973, with Ferguson, Shaw, Robert Kerr, and Roman Kroitor the inventors of IMAX. Currently, the corporation's space shuttle films The Dream Is Alive and Hail Columbia are showing in another return engagement in Toronto at Ontario Place's Cinesphere Theatre. The dome-screen IMAX OM-NIMAX projection system, meanwhile, will be featured when EXPO 86 opens May 2 in Vancouver as one of 48 such world-wide theatre locations.

Press helps Wildman rescue his Genie award

TORONTO - John Wildman, selected best actor at the 1986 Genie Awards for his role in My American Cousin, has his award back after a week of wondering where it went to and why. The actor noticed his statuette missing following his return from the Genie gala dance floor to the table where he'd left it.

Wildman, who never directly said his Genie had been stolen and hoped to see it recovered without involving the police, had his cause taken up by the Toronto Sun entertainment columnist, Bruce Kirkland. Kirkland's 'no questions asked' telephone line received several unidentified calls indicating who had heisted the 14inch-tall, 7-pound gold-plated statuette.

The informers, revealing as well a sense of mea culpa over Wildman's discomfort, said the

incident was motivated by the urge for a cheap thrill. Through the Sun, Wildman paid a surprise visit the weekend of March 29-30 to the home where his Genie had been held hostage and liberated it. Wildman's agent, Gayle Abrams, credited the reaction of the local press for the Genie's return to Wildman who, she said, was as excited retrieving it as when he first received it the evening of the Genie Awards, March 20.

gratefully While Abrams

commented of the incident's conclusion "It's out of the Wildman would have way." faced paying the approximate \$400 cost of a replacement statuette if the original had remained missing. Genie Awards organisers, the Academy of Canadian Cinema and Television refuses responsibility once the awards have been handed out. According to the Academy, the incident is apparently the first instance in which a Genie has gone 'missing' or been stolen.

Sheffer confirmed the poster had been totally paid by one of the Genie Awards sponsors, Air Canada, which presented the Air Canada Award March 20 to André Collette. Dom Perignon's contribution was made just prior to the Genie presentations in the form of 48 bottles of their bubbly
