The motion picture art with its ability to exercise ideas in the most visual way, and with its penetrative power could be the art form which conveys to us the vision of our Canadian civilization.


Bearing such kind of motion picture in mind, the government of Canada should support every effort being made by Canadian filmmakers using all possible means to get Canadian film production off the ground.


